CIPPENHAM TABLE TENNIS LUB

ANNUAL REPORT 1984-5

INTRODUCTION

The season just finished will be remembered as one of the most important in the club's history. Success on the table has become almost a habit as our teams and players have swept all before them in the last two years, yet this season was also a difficult and, at times, traumatic one for the club.

The highlights were a second successive double of Slough and Maidenhead league titles, the move to a multi-table venue, the commencement of a junior coaching scheme, the trauma of sponsorship dealings and the recent decision to withdraw from the National League.

MEMBERSH P

The number of full members of the club rose from 23 to 33 while another eight represented the club in matches, making a total of 41 players who appeared for the club over the last twelve months. The club operated seven teams in the Slough Lague, an increase of one, and two in the senior section in Maidenhead, also an increase of one. In addition the club erpered a team in the Maidenhead Youth Division for the first time. Thus a total of eleven teams were run, including one in the National League. We still have some way to go before we onto again run eleven teams in the Slough League as we did some years ago.

During the season Frank Earis made his 300th apperance for the club while Dave Pourtney celebrated his 200th. Graham Trim and and Peter Hillier have the most with 568 and 383 respectively.

ADMINIST ATION

In the club's busiest season administratively the Management Committee elected at the Arnual General Meeting last May met seven lines. Official positions of Coaching Administrator and Venue Liaison Officer were created at a Special General Heeting, held in September for the purpose of reconstituting the club for the rove to a new venue and potential sponsor ship, and filled by the Management Committee. In a searon when a great deal of work was met by an enthusiastic selection of officials and ordinary members, it is disappointing that some committee members failed to honour their commitments.

Thanks are due to the team captains who, in the main, organised their teams in an efficient and responsible manner. The club's notice board was resurrected upon relocation at Haymill and provided a source of information and advertisement.

Once again the club attracted extensive publicity for all it's activities in the local newspapers, gaining a total of 1630 column inches with reports submitted by the club. In addition, as champions, the club naturally featured prominently in articles from the two local leagues. The National League team alone are sed 1330 column inches from three papers, which compares favourably with a bist ever 1465 from four papers in 1981-2. Coverage actually improved on the previous three seasons when, on each occasion, it was described by the English Table Tennis Association as the best in the country.

The Slow h League Management Committee was well blessed with Cippenham members. Graham T imming acted as Chairman/Fixtures Secretary, Jacquie Farwell as General Secretary, Peter Hillier Treasurer, Rodney Potts Inter-League Secretary and Gare h Lovell as a committee member in charge of the Slough Closed Champion hip. In addition Mike Davis was Handicap Secretary/Tournament Secretar on the Maidenhead Association committee and Graham Trimming became a Buckingh ashire selector. At the Slough League's Annual General Meeting in May 1984 Peter Hillier was awarded the Joe Coral Trophy, an annual presentation for serv ces to the League and local table tennis.

VENUE AN - EQUIPMENT

The much awaited move to Haymill Centre took place on 18th October, providing the club with facilities for four fully screened match courts and five tables in open lan for coaching and practice. This represented a fulfilment the club had long sought after growing out of the single table venue used at St. Andrews hared Church since the formation of the club in 1973. The physical move was made prior to matches on the opening night through extraordinary effort to many members, and after three weeks of hard work for Jackie Thomas in rearranging matches at St. Andrews. Frank Earlis has represented the club on the Haymill User Group, formed to provide usems an involvement in the management of the centre, and which has representatives on the Haymill Management Committee.

St. Andr ws has continued to be used for table to mis; the venue being let out to the Buzhy and Farnham Royals teams and for Slough League representative matches in the Bucks Inter-League competition. Increases in the charges from £1.00 per hour, to £1.50 on 1st January and £2.00 on 1st April have been incurred in the last year.

The club 3 objectives in moving to Haymill were described as:

- 1. 3 establish a base for the development of Cippenham TTC
- 2. provide top class match facilities
- 3. provide good quality practice facilities
- 4. o encourage newconers of all ages to the sport
- 5. > establish coaching schemes
- 6. a quacruple club nembership
- 7. develop players' abilities through the club, league, county and ational competitive system
- 8. a utilise the expertise of the club's players, coaches and ministrators for the benefit of table tennis.

The firs estimate of expenditure required to develop the venue fully was presente to the Sports Council as £3361. Currels opinions are that this is more realistically stated as £5500. This involves the provision of five Nippon Rollaway tables, one of which was purchased in Soutember, the court surrounds delivered in November, installation of eighteen 100W tungsten halogen lamps and curtaining of 200 square yards of window area. The increase is largely the result of regulations issued by Berkshire County Council that an approved contract rounst be appointed for all electrical work, and the necessity for

the curtains to be file-proofed. Our immediate pulprity remains the curtaining of the windows. Four of the club's five existing tables were moved to Haymill on opening night, the original Jaques Tournament table, which is now twelve years old being retained at St. Andrews.

The club obtain d a license to use a temporary lighting installation for three not he are is very grateful to Mike Davis who designed and built a very efficient pulls system to suspend one lamp above each of four courts. A permanent lighting solution has been costed at £1800.

From it's open g until mid April the club has utilised the gymnasium at Haymill on Tuer by and Thursday evenings at a cost of £20 per session. Thursdays were allocated for matches in the Slough League and Maidenhead Youth Division while mesday became coaching and practice evening with matches in the senior sestion of the Maidenhead League. From mid April Tuesday was dropped while Thursday as cultailed to 6.30 to 10.00 p.m. for coaching and practice. From mid June Soumer League matches are scheduled from 8 p.m. on Thursday evenings. A return to evenings per week is anticipated for the next winter season.

In November the club played host to the Slough League's annual Hard Bat Tourname as a test to see how the venue coped with a small competition of this nature.

GRALTS AT SPOT ORSHI

A grant of £200 has been made to the club from the Sports Council against £3361 estimated capital investment in setting up at Haymill. To date £670 has been necessary d in support of a claim for £1125 expenditure. This unusually large great was made ofter a visit to Haymill by a Sports Council representative where he met of the off cials, and a detailed written presentation which was made to him by the cl b.

Slough Borough Duncil's Lottery Fund has twice rejected applications for assistance, although on the latter occasion it referred the matter to Berkshire County Council. However in financial year 1983-4 the Lottery Fund did make the cluber grand of £500 towards last season's National League team expenses. A re-application will be presented on the basis of our withdrawal from the National League Several more possible sources are known to the club and applications for grand aid are in hand.

A small a bunt of money was raised following approaches to Slough trading companies in Au ust of last year.

Also in A gust he club signed a second three year contract with Butterfly (UK) Ltd. for the provision of kit and equipment to the National League team at a sign ficant discount.

During the firs half of the season attempts were made by the club to secure commercial spon orship. An agent was appointed, working for commission fee only, and a prospectual issued to likely candidates. The fee was a large amount of money enough to equip Haymill and subsidise the season. In what turned out to be a most exasperating experience we were led to believe that five companies and shown great interest and the club signed an agreement with one of these. Or reasons unknown to the club the prospective sponsor did not respond a did not time and energy was expended with a most disappointing conclusion.

FINANCE

The combination of investment in equipment, the high cost of hiring Haymill and the failure to increase fees at the Special General Meeting served to deplete the club's cash resources this season. As at 15th May funds stood at £692 with room hire liability of £58 for the first half of May, making a working belance of £634 compared with about £900 brought forward last year.

Subsidisation of the club's activities cannot continue and increases in fees will be recessary for next season. The Management Committee has been discussing various fee structures and these will be debated at the Annual General Meeting.

During the season the club made an unsuccessful attempt to register for Value Added Tar in order to reclaim input tax paid on equipment purchased for Haymill.

Remembering the fears of some members regarding the possible financial strain on the club through competing in the National League, it is worth noting that the opposite has been the case. After four years the club has £190 left in it's National I ague account which has bought a great deal of equipment at discount 1 prices, and produced bank interest on the sponsorship funds deposite.

NATIONAL EAGU

Cippenhams for th, and most successful, season in the Halex National League was also it's last, as the club announced at the end of April that it would not participate near season. The paramount reason was a lack of local players able to compete successfully in a very strong division, and the financial and other problems, such as lessening enthusiasm of the club's officials, that a team composed entirely of players from outside the district would produce.

The team dinished a creditable fourth in the Third Division South of eight clubs, eight points clear of teams below, and for the first three months of the seast held the distinction of heading the division. Richard Beckhan, from London, and Maidenhead champion Steve Everard were signed last summer and took their places in a six man squad along with Ray Tilling, Alec Watson, Clive Young and Frank Earis. In addition Dave Pountney and Graham Trimming were registered as receives, and the latter made his debut in the very last match. Inchard added a solidity to the team at number two, previously our problem position, and finished with the best record. Alec, Ray and Clive also performed well, each winning more than half of his matches, but Steve was unable to reproduce the form he is sometimes capable of. In all, seven of the fourteen matches were won, three drawn and four lost.

Three veries were used for home matches. The first three fixtures were all played in the I limar Hall at Slough Centre, used in the previous three seasons, then a more was made to Haynill. The first match there was played in a cold, dank gym sium before alternative and more appealing, except for a slippery floor, a somedation was found in the main assembly hall with raised seating for speciators on the stage.

Match properties on was completed with Peter Hillier and Brian Jerome as officials, Grahom Tribming as announcer and a bufflet meal was provided after each match.

TEAM COM TITIC S

National Club (ampio ship

As champions, Oppenham was honoured to represent slough for the fifth consecutive season in the Conesby Cup, the national mens' club championship. An invitation was also received to represent Maidenhead but this was declined. After the successful run of 1984 we were disappointed at being eliminated in the first round in Bridge rater, to a team defeated 5-1 in the third round the previous year.

Slough Lague

Champions for the second successive season, and the fifth time overall, the club also enulated it is 1978 performance in providing the top two teams in Division One. Congratulations to champions Buccameers represented by Dave Pountney, Frank Earis and John Lewis and aided by Steve Everard and Colin Dyke. The equality consistent Outlaws team, who finished one point behind in second place and eleven points clear of the third placed team, were Peter Swinn, Martin Ling and Graham Trimming.

Our other succe sful side was the Villains who were entered with only Mike Davis and Frank Cowler as named players. Thankfully newcomers to the area Steve Dourell and Kay Kennedy joined their ranks and proved highly successful in winning Division Three. Of the other teams Regues finished eighth in Division One, Togabor's fourth in Division Two and Rascals also fourth in Division Three. Rebels ended the season propping ap every other team in Division four and did not claim a point until strengthened late in the season. However this represented a bold effort by a very inexperienced team that maintained it's presence after being badly let down prior to the start of the season by the players the team was originally arranged for.

Dave Pour Sney topped the Division One averages, followed by Frank Earis in second place, Inter Skinn fifth and Martin King alath. In Division Two Ken Phillips was fourth while Steve Dorrell headed Division Three with Pan Spooner second. Kay Konnedy eighth and Mike Davis ninth.

In the Dalger C p team handicap competition three leans, Vagabonds, Villains and Rascals all enjoyed a successful run until beaten in quarter-final matches.

Maidenhe l League

For the first time the club entered two teams in the Premier Division of the Maidenhe League. In an extraordinarily successful season the Spartans team did the 'double' of league and knock-out handicap cup playing quite superbly throughout. In the league they finished seventeen points clear of their nearest rivals to retain the championship and have now performed the unique double of Slough and Maidenhead league titles on three occasions. The winning combination was Alec Matson, Frank Earis, John Lewis and Dave Pountney.

The knock-out cap was won despite being the most heavily handicapped side in the competition and their pedigree was never more needed than in overcoming a 350 point start in the semi-final.

Trojans Chishe eighth in the Premier Division and another first, the Athenian team in the Youth Division, ended the campaign minth in their section. This as the first taste of competition for our two young ladies, Erma Thomas and Julie Bell.

Alec Watern fullilled his ambition of winning the Wilkinson Sword, a magnificant trophy awarded to the player with the best average in the Premier Division. Not Car behind was Frank Earis in fifth position.

Buckingh shir competitions

A rare dicapposition in a season of triumph came when the club's first team had to concede their dirst round match in the Buckinghamshire Prenier Division Challenge Cup, the county championship. Thus the club lost it's grip on a title it had were previously in the inaugural season of the competition.

The second team also ment out in the first round as did the fourth team in the Intermediate Knack-Out Cup, a competition for second and third division sides. However at made presented no problems to our third team although they were then beaden by the Malton Keynes Division One leaders.

Another Couble, this time the Surmer League titles of both Slough and Maidenhed. The successful duo were Graham Trimming and Rodney Potts, retaining their Slough Longue thtle which the club has now won six times in the last eight years.

If not content ipper and Beta were runners-up in Slough where the averages in Division one was a healed by Graham Trimming. He was followed by Bob Keeley second, Todney Botts shird and Gareth Lovell fifth.

In the M. denhand averages Graham Trimming came second and Rodney Potts third.

INDIVIDU SUCCESSES

This sead in was probably the club's most successful ever in terms of silverware won by individual members. The Slough mens singles events were dominated by Cippenham players as have Pountney won the Slough Closed event and Frank Earis both the flough Masters Tournament, in which five of the eight qualifiers were Cippenham players, and the Hard Bat Championship.

Back to the Slough Clased where Dave Pountney and Frank Earis won the Mens Doubles, with I dooln Hicks and Roy Mitchell the runners-up, Frank also retained his Volerans Singles title and Steve Dommell won the Division Three Singles event.

At the M denk i Closed John Lewis and Dave Pourtney played superbly to clinch the Mens Doubles and Alec Watson was untroubled in the Veterans Singles. Mens Singles tinner tere, and in the Berkshire Closed, was Steve Everard playing at his peak although representing another club while doing so. Also at the Berkshire Closed Date Pourtney, partnered by Peter Swinn representing his Reading club, reached the first of the Mens Doubles, while Jacquie Farwell went one better in winning the Lactors Doubles.

The Veterins Singles dinal at the Buckinghamshire Closed Championships was an all Cipps ham adding with Alec Watson beating Frank Earis, and Graham Trimming reached the first of the Restricted Singles. At the same tournament Jacquie Farwell, representing her Slough League club, was runner-up in the Ladies Singles.

The club roduced all four semi-finalists for the Lynford Bowl, the Slough League's individual headicap competition, and this was won as part of a unique double with the Wharton Vase ladies handicap by Pam Spooner.

Some ver, respectable results were also produced by our few representatives at the English Classed Championships, none more so than by Frank Earis in reaching the quarterfit of the Mens Veterans Singles. Then Frank followed this up by a similar performance at the VETTS National Championships recently.

Our National Lague players also won several titles - Richard Beckhan the London and National (ivil Service championships and the Central London League title, Lay Tilling the Dulwich League event and 6 ive Young the mens singles title at the Hompshire Closed. In addition Ray was reached the semi-final of the mans singles at the Bath Open.

REPRESEN ATIVE HONOULS AND RANKINGS

Alec Wat on and Frank Earis were ever present in the Buokinghamshire veterans team that won all it is matches to clinch Division 2a of the County Championships and promition for the second successive season. Ith five 5-4 wins in their seven outings the team owed their Premier Division status to the magnificent record of Alec who remained unbeaten throughout.

Alec, raked maker one in Bucks veterans, was than added to the mens list at number five after Christnas, and made one appearance for the senior team after an absence of a my years. Also called up by Buck were Julie Bell and Emma Thomas for the two friendly natches arranged for the junior side. Unfortunately Erma was unable to play. Frank Earis was ranked number two in the veterans and then als added to the senior list at number ten in January, while Jacquie Farwell and Jackie Thomas were ranked three and mix respectively in the ladies. Jacquie arwell appeared for the team late in the season.

Over in Terkshi se Steve Everard and Dave Pountne; appeared on the mens ranking list and were ramed at reserves for the county to m, and Colin Dyke was a regular in the veterans team. Ray Tilling and Ro hard Beckham both appeared for Kent II while Clive Young was ranked fifth fo

Hampshire.

After Ra Tilling had become the first Cippenham layer to gain an England mens ranking in the previous season he was then joine by Richard Beckham and Alec Watson. Ray's nighes: position was an excellent 4 while Richard reached 85. Alec made a brief appearance at 198 solely through his results playing in Cippenha natches.

Alec Wat on (27), Frank Earis (34) and Colin Dyke (51) all made the England veterans list, and the placings of the first two amed should improve considerably after reults at the national championships have sen included.

Cippenham had ton representatives in the Slough moter-league teams including provision of the captains for all three mens team. Martin King, Graham Trimming and Rodney Potts. Peter Hillier captained the velorans 'B' team and, in addition Frank Earis, Peter Swinn, Steve Dorrell Kay Kennedy, Jackie Thomas and Ken billing all appeared for the town.

During to season Buc tinghamshire inaugurated a computer ratings scheme, points being wor by players through wins in local league, inter-league, closed champion hips and other competitions. In the only list published, in December, thirteen Cipper am players appeared headed by Ale: Watson (7) and Frank Earis (17).

This searon the club championship was held on a Morth Sunday afternoon on five tables in the grammasi mat Haymill. Members of the club's coaching scheme were invited to compute in two junior events, one hand capped, while senior league players had five even a including, for the first wine, separate mens and ladies singles.

Organised by Ja kie Tomas, the tournament was a reat success although an unfortunate claim of lates with the Berkshire Claim dimension the loss of six top players. The total entry was twenty-six, split equally between seniors and juniors. The children especially enjoyed their functions competitive experience and organised a fund-aising refreshment stall. For the first time in many years the club shampionship did not make a financial loss.

Frank Earis won the mens singles, while Jackie Thomas collected the ladies singles and Mougan Stevens made it a day to remember by winning both the junior events. Kay Konnedy was a popular winner of the handicap singles and partnered Frank to victory in the handicap doubles while Graham Trimming and Rodney Potts captured the clampionship doubles.

OTHER ACTIVITIES

Coaching

On November 20th the club commenced a weekly junior coaching scheme on Tuesday evenings 6.30 to 8 p.m. A successful start was made with all the participants being beginners and has continued since though changing to Thursday evenings after Easter.

Initially attendances averaged ten but an improvement has been evident since the change of day and a recent session attracted a best ever eighteen. The sessions have been organised by Rodney Potts and he has received great support from Ken Phillips, Graham Trimming and Jackie Thomas with Frank Earis, Mike Davis and Terry Stevens all assisting fairly regularly. On most occasions there has been one adult "feeder" on each of five tables. After the initial enthusiasm the support of other members has not been encouraging and it has so far proved impossible to produce the intended rota.

Practice sessions

Initially pre-pason practice sessions were organised at St. Andrews for the purpose of enrolling newcomers to the club, then after the move to Haynill in October regular Tuesday sessions on four tables were held from 8 to 10 p.m. The response has generally been disappointing, with the majority of participants being non-members of the club, and the expected attraction for newcomers to take up the sport has so far not materialised. A change to Thursday evenings after Easter was made with a view to the possibility of improved attendances through a reduced incidence of clashes with matches.

Social events

The club took a table at the Slough Sportsman's Ball held at the Fulcrum Léisure Centre in February and was also represented at the Mayor of Slough's reception for a "handing over ceremony" of the sponsorship for the National League team from the Borough's Lottery Fund.

A table was also taken at the Maidenhead Association's presentation dinner dance in May.

Slough Health Fobit

The club, along with many other local sporting organisations, has lent it's support to the Slough Health Habit, a pioneer venture in Slough, aiming to reduce heart and arterial disease, set up by the local health authority.

The scheme commenced in May with a Health Fair and Fun Run in which the club had four participants.
